will be our special guest musicians at our Celtic Worship Sunday. They play Traditional Celtic music with captivating original sounds and its roots in tradition. Graham **Lindsey** is a tune-writer and session musician. Four of his tunes have been performed on the Carillon in the Peace Tower on Parliament Hill where he was welcomed as guest composer in 2019. Kristan Couture is originally a Saskatchewan girl where she won the 2018 Saskatchewan Country Music Award for Fiddler of the Year. and received final ballot nominations for her roots album "You Just Fooled Me". She performed as a classical violinist with the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra for four years and toured and performed with local country bands and folk artists across Canada. Ottawaborn and raised Kyle Jordan rounds out the trio with driving Celtic rhythms and a background in Gypsy jazz. His compositions also round out the band's sound, with fresh new instrumentals.

From Away will take you back and forth between the timelessness of the prairie folk and upbeat jigs and driving reels of traditional Irish music.
